



CONFLICT MINERAL COMPLIANCE LETTER

The provisions of Section 1502 of the 2010 Dodd-Frank Wall Street Reform and Consumer Protection Act require that certain companies are to disclose the use of "conflict minerals" in their products (i.e. certain minerals, including tin, tantalum, tungsten, and gold, that may have originated in the Democratic Republic of Congo or adjoining countries). While we are not regulated by this Act, we provide this statement to our customers who request our assistance in assessing their "conflict minerals" status.

We take seriously concerns that profits from conflict minerals may be fueling human rights violations, labor abuses, and environmental degradation and are committed to the ethical sourcing of any minerals used in our manufacturing and supply chain. Following a good faith diligent inquiry, we do not have any reason to believe that our manufacturing facilities or supply chain use any "conflict minerals".

This letter is valid for the year 2026.
